Principles for digital tools

- Overcome barriers to adoption by using tools that are currently used by professionals in industry.
- There are some face-to-face interactions that cannot be substituted digitally, for now.
- Minimise adoption fatigue by using the same tools across all subjects in a degree.
- Introduce new students to the digital tools so that they understand the what, why, and how of usage.



Slack #Announcements


Already used professionally by many designers, Slack makes it easy for educators, students, and alumni to keep in touch with each other.

Key Features

- A specific #BulletinBoard channel separates key notices and keeps them easy to find
- Pin or star important notices and set up automatic reminders for deadlines
- Announce new short courses and upcoming public events to students and alumni

How it works

- Important notices should be posted in a separate channel so they are not drowned in day-to-day chatter
- @channel and @here commands can be used for very important notifications
- Making Slack the main channel of communication reduces confusion among students and simplifies communication for educators

Slack Student collaboration


Slack is an instant messaging app designed for easier collaboration. It bridges the gap between email (professional) and instant messenger (casual).

Key Features

- Encourage collaboration by conveying a sense of digital presence
- Many working designers already use Slack
- Reduce confusion by completely supplanting UTS email, personal/professional email, private instant messenger, and SMS.

How it works

- Each subject should have its own channel
- Easy file sharing as well as integrations with Dropbox and Google Drive
- Chat history is searchable





Slack Just-in-time outline

Slack's /remind feature can be used to automatically deliver subject outlines week-to-week. Subject deliverables and assessment criteria can also be communicated at the appropriate time in the semester.

Key Features


- Break down subject outlines into digestible chunks and minimise the mental overhead for working students
- Free up class time for genuinely valuable discussion and activities

How it works

- The section of the subject outline that pertains to the coming week is sent 1hr before class begins
- A clear throughline is established that connects class and homework exercises with subject deliverables and outcomes
